The tone of Lent urges us all to the forgiveness of sins. We must do penance. The Church wants to make the sacrament of penance more available during Lent. Here in our parishes we have the sacrament available on Thursdays from 3:00 to 4:00, on Saturdays from 3:45 to 4:45, on weekdays when we have school, from 6:00 to 6:25; on Thursday, March 18, at 7:00 with over seven priests helping with the Penance Service. We also shall schedule more times later in Lent.

Parents should see that they allow their children to receive the sacrament. They can bring them to the large penance service March 18 or any of the other times. Parents, show your children your example by receiving the sacrament.

If you missed in February because of the snow, bad weather or sickness, you did not commit sin. You can only sin by deciding freely not to do what you ought to do or to do what you ought not to do.

ARCHBISHOP SCHNURR'S HOMILY FOR SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT 2010 (Catholic Ministries Appeal)

Based on the Lectionary readings for the **Second Sunday of Lent**, **Year** C

Genesis 15:5-12,17-18 Psalm 27:1-14 Philippians 3:17-4:1 Luke 9:28-36

Hello, I'm Archbishop Dennis Schnurr, and I am grateful for the opportunity to speak with you today—and for the technology that allows us to come together across the Archdiocese. Gratitude is at the heart of my message today, as it is at the heart of every Eucharist we celebrate. Later in this Mass, as the priest prays the Preface to the Eucharistic Prayer, we will hear the familiar words:

Father, all-powerful and ever-living God, we do well always and everywhere to give you thanks.

On this Second Sunday of Lent, the Preface goes on to say:

This great season of grace is your gift to your family to renew us in spirit.

We have been given Lent, this "great season of grace," by God, as we have been given all that we are and all that we have. And we are called to give thanks to God for His gifts, **always and everywhere.** How can we do that?

There are times when we may feel so overwhelmed by the magnitude of God's generosity to us that we do not know where to begin to say thanks. At other times, the circumstances in our lives may make it difficult for us to see and appreciate the gifts we have been given. In today's First Reading, taken from the Book of Genesis, we find Abram, our ancestor in faith, experiencing both of these extremes.

Abram is overwhelmed by God's promise to make this aged, childless man the father of a great nation and to give this nomadic herder a homeland of his own. In the face of such abundance, who of us would not be at loss for words? But Abram is also aware of how unlikely it is, in the world's eyes, that these promises will ever be fulfilled. The Scriptures tell us that "a deep and terrifying darkness enveloped" Abram (Genesis 15:12). In that darkness, at the lowest point of his life, Abram receives a dazzling revelation of God's presence and a confirmation of God's gifts.

We who are the descendants of Abraham, numberless as the stars, stand here today as proof of God's generosity. And from his story, we receive a lesson on how to respond to God's generosity—by making it possible for the light of God's loving presence to be revealed in our world.

That is the mission of the Church, as the Apostles Peter, James, and John learn in today's Gospel. On Mount Tabor, they were privileged to witness the transfigured glory of the Lord. But it's not enough simply to receive the gift. The Apostles do not get to put up tents and sit around luxuriating in the revelation of God's love. They—and we—must go down the mountain, where there's work to do.

Our work as Church is to give thanks by giving—to seek the light of God's presence and to share it with a world too often enveloped in deep and terrifying darkness. There is no better way we can show our gratitude to God than by showing God to others who are so hungry for Him. My own episcopal motto, taken from Psalm 104, is *Quaerite faciem Domini-*"Seek the face of the Lord." It's echoed in Psalm 27, today's responsorial:

"Come," says my heart, "seek God's face"; your face, LORD, do I seek! (Psalm 27:8)

Fortunately, we here in Southern Ohio are blessed with a unique opportunity to show God's face and share God's love. This Second Sunday of Lent also marks the beginning of another "great season of grace" in the Archdiocese of Cincinnati, as we begin our Catholic Ministries Appeal.

Once a year, we are asked to support the Church's mission by making a financial gift to the Catholic Ministries Appeal. I use the pronoun we intentionally, because responding to the Catholic Ministries Appeal is truly an opportunity for us to be united in our mission—to be the Church universal. I've seen countless examples of the good work we are doing in our individual parishes, but there are some things we can do much better together.

The six vital ministries funded by our Catholic Ministries Appeal gifts are not just items on a balance sheet: they are ways we give thanks to God, always and everywhere. I've made my personal gift in response to this year's appeal, and in this week's mail you'll receive a personal invitation from me to join as generously as you can in this shared act of gratitude. Now I want to take a few minutes to remind you of some of the specific ways we are showing God's face and sharing God's love through the ministries supported by the Catholic Ministries Appeal.

In times of great need—times like those that many in our region are still facing—in such times, Catholic Charities Southwestern Ohio and Catholic Social Services of the Miami Valley assist thousands of people, whatever their faith background. Through the ministries of Catholic Charities, we show people God's face in the form of bread, shelter, a job, a new family for a child. The Second Harvest Food Bank in Springfield, which supplies 2.7 million pounds of food to more than 120 agencies in three counties each year, is just one of many places where people will see God's face this year because of our gifts.

Our support of the Catholic Ministries Appeal also helps nourish people with the Bread of Life in the Eucharist. Catholic Ministries Appeal supports the Archdiocese's vocations outreach, and assists young men called to priesthood as they undertake their formation at The Arhenaeum of Ohio/Mount St. Mary's Seminary. Increasing vocation awareness, with a special emphasis on priestly vocations, is a special commitment of mine. With God's help and our gifts, we will welcome more seminarians to join our dedicated lay ministers and deacons, whose education at the Athenaeum is also supported by the Catholic Ministries Appeal.

The college years can be a challenging time for young Catholics, especially those who attend public or non-Catholic private institutions. The services provided by college campus ministers-services funded by the Catholic Ministries Appeal—can help young people wrestle with questions of faith and future. The fellowship, prayer, and outreach provided by campus ministry often allow students to seek God's face hear God's call clearly for the first time.

The Gospels often tell us of Jesus' healing outreach to people who have difficulty communicating. At St. Rita School for the Deaf, our Catholic Ministries Appeal gifts help continue the healing ministry, freeing children and their families to hear and to be heard.

As Catholics in the Archdiocese of Cincinnati, we owe a great debt of gratitude to those of our faith family who went before us. I give special thanks for the ministry of my brother priests, who, though officially "retired," nevertheless continue their lives of prayer and service in so many important ways. Our Catholic Ministries Appeal gifts provide support for the pensions and health care of retired archdiocesan priests, who show us God's face in a very special way.

When we are facing some of the toughest challenges in life—a health crisis, the loss of a loved one, incarceration—it can be difficult to find anything for which to give thanks. But we are deeply grateful for the ministry of the chaplains who are there with us in those hours that we stand at the foot of the cross, chaplains who help us see God's dazzling love even in our deep and terrifying darkness. The ministry of chaplains in hospitals and prisons, supported by our gifts to the Catholic Ministries Appeal, touches and changes lives. And it is a two-way street. Chaplains are often touched and changed by those to whom they minister.

None of these vital ministries can be accomplished by any one person, clergy or lay, working alone. Nor can they be the exclusive work of one parish, or agency, or the diocesan chancery. To do this great work together requires the support of each one of us, prayerfully considered and generously given. For that I am grateful, because it is a reminder of how much we need one another as members of the Body of Christ. Working together in this way, we fulfill the promise announced by St. Paul in today's Second Reading, taken from the Letter to the Philippians:

[The Lord] will change our lowly body to conform with his glorified body. (Philippians 3:21)

In other words, we, too, are transfigured. We reflect the light of God's face to the world.

If you have never given to support the Catholic Ministries Appeal, I respectfully ask you to consider doing so. If you have given in the past, I join all those whose lives your gift has touched to say *Thank you*, and I encourage you to continue your generosity and commitment. Together, we have so much to be thankful for, always and everywhere. May God richly bless you with His presence throughout this season of grace, and always. Amen!
