FATHER DAVE'S COLUMN

Monthly I meet with a priests' growth group. We include celebrating Mass together. Monday, for the first time since we started using the new trsansalation, we concelebrated together. We often used the wrong responses and had to think twice when answering to the "The Lord be with you." I find it easier to make my changes, as the presiding priest, than for the congregation to make theirs. We did study the art of concelebrating before Mass, so we did well on this.

LITURGY AND CHRISTMAS

We used to have the Three Masses of Christmas, but since the change in the Church's calendar after the Second Vatican Council, we have four. The Vigil celebrates the marriage of God to the human race and the human ancestry of Jesus. It gives us the genealogy according to Matthew, the gospel with forty-two personal names. The Mass at Night celebrates the birth of the Lord Jesus on whose shoulder dominion rests. The Mass at Dawn celebrates the visit of the shepherds. The Mass during the Day celebrates the Word-Made-Flesh among us. It uses the prologue to John's Gospel.

This prologue in a real sense offers a better proclamation of the birth because the eternal Word of God, the source and instrument of creation, took flesh in the womb of a woman and made his dwelling among us.


CREED: BOWING

<u>Matthew 1, 1-25</u>: We trace the ancestry of Jesus to Abraham in a list that some call the Lectors' revenge on gospel readers because of the many names in the list.

Isaiah 62, 1-5: Isaiah celebrates God's wedding to the human race.

Psalm 89: We sing of how God keeps his covenant with David.

Acts 13, 16-17. 22-25: Jesus, the Christ, has human ancestors that go back, through King David, to our beginnings.

<u>Luke 2, 1-14:</u> Angels announce the good news to people in fields, not in palaces.

<u>Isaiah 9, 1-7:</u> The birth of a Prince brings light to darkened eyes, and promises peace anew.

Psalm 96: Earth and heaven rejoice in the birth of the Savior.

<u>Titus 2, 11-14:</u> God's reveals his grace, always at work in the world, in Jesus Christ.

MASS AT DAWN (8:00):

<u>Luke 2, 15-20:</u> Those who recognize the Child find joy as they praise and glorify God.

Isaiah 62, 11-12: God now calls his people The Redeemed.

Psalm 97: Let all the earth celebrate the birth of the Lord.

<u>Titus 3, 4-7:</u> God's kindness, always present, we find manifest in the Christ, the Savior of the world.

John 1, 1-18: Some consider this the true gospel for Christmas: The Word of God has taken on human nature.

<u>Isaiah 52, 7-10:</u> We proclaim from the mountains the coming of peace.

<u>Hebrews 1, 1-6</u>: The author teaches that Jesus comes to us as the living Word of God, the definitive revelation of God's goodness.

JANUARY 1: MARY, MOTHER OF GOD

THE DATE OF CHRISTMAS

I have heard several explanations why we celebrate the birth of Christ on December. I think the best explanation comes down to this.

The ancient world had a notion that the perfect life began and ended on the same date. According to one calculation Jesus died on April 6 or March 25. This date would also mark the date of his conception. Nine months from conception we come to birth. Some Eastern Churches celebrate the Nativity nine months after April 6, on January 6. The Western Church celebrates it nine months after the March date, December 25.

John the Baptist, a half-year older than Jesus, has his birthday on June 24, a day shy of the perfect nine months. This differentiates him from the Perfect Man, Jesus Christ.

NEW MINISTERS OF COMMUNION AND SERVERS

We recently commissioned Jenni Neiberg, Megan VanSkyock and Conner Reed as Extraordinary Ministers of Communion. We recently trained Brennan Gaier as a server. The faith of our young people has led many of them to serve the church during the sacred Liturgy.

THE RITUAL OF THE SACRAMENT OF PENANCE

When you come for the sacrament of penance, the priest should welcome you warmly. Then you and he make the sign of the cross together.

Next he gives you a blessing. You do not have to ask for the blessing; he gives it. In this blessing, he invites you to trust in God.

Next, he reads a passage from Scripture that calls us to conversion.

Next, you briefly confess your sins. The priest will help you if you need help. The priest will try to say something to help you

He will propose for you an act of penance, formerly called a penance, to help you amend your life. You may ask the priest to substitute something else for you if you prefer something else.

You then say a prayer of sorrow, once called an act of contrition. You may use one of the forms given in the ritual or use your own words.

The priest will then give you absolution. You answer, "Amen" after it.

He then leads you in a proclamation of praise. You answer by saying, "His mercy endures forever."

Lastly, he dismisses you. At this point, the ritual has no response for you to say, but usually when the priest dismisses, you respond, "Thanks be to God." This response seems appropriate here since Christ forgives our sins, through the ministry of the Church.

You may clip this and save it for when you come to the sacrament of penance.

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DECORATING OUR CHURCHES

We wait until the last Mass of Advent before we decorate our churches. Unless otherwise noted, we shall decorate on Friday, December 23, at 10:00 a.m. unless we have a funeral, in which case, we shall do it at 1:00 p.m.

PROCLAMATION OF THE BIRTH OF JESUS CHRIST

(This comes from the <u>Roman Martyrology</u>, the official catalog of liturgical celebrations, and dates back many centuries.)

The Twenty-fifth Day of December,

When ages beyond number had run their course from the creation of the world (*The world dates farther back than we can count*),

When God in the beginning created heaven and earth, and formed man in his own likeness (God did create the universe and make us in his image and likeness (Genesis 1:27));

when century upon century had passed

since the Almighty set his bow in the clouds after the Great Flood, as a sign of covenant and peace (dated

back in what we call pre-history);

In the twenty-first century since Abraham, our father in faith, came out of Ur of the Chaldees (2000-1700 B.C.); In the thirteenth century since the People of Israel were led by Moses in the Exodus from Egypt;

ed by Moses in the Exodus from Egypt,

around the thousandth year since David was anointed King;

in the sixty-fifth week of the prophecy of Daniel (See Daniel 9:20-27; this would make Jesus about 33 years old at his death.);

in the hundred-ninety-fourth Olympiad (The ancients held the Olympics every four years, starting in the year 776 B.C.);

in the year seven hundred and fifty-two since the

foundation of the City of Rome (*The legendary date for the founding of the city of Rome*);

in the forty-second year of the reign of Caesar Octavian Augustus (Octavian reigned after Julius Caesar's death in 44 B.C.),

the whole world being at peace (*The Romans imposed peace at the threat of extermination*),

JESUS CHRIST, eternal God and Son of the eternal Father (*This stresses the divinity of both the Father and the Son*), desiring to consecrate the world by his most loving

presence (the coming of Christ consecrates the world), was conceived by the Holy Spirit (note the role of the Holy Spirit),

and when nine months had passed since his conception, was born of the Virgin Mary in Bethlehem of Judah, and

was made man (*This stresses the human nature of Jesus*): The Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ according to the flesh.

(The Martyrology declares Jesus Christ eternal in his divinity and temporal in his humanity, one divine person with two natures.)
